Parishioner to Parishioners

To be a Saint – Are we moving toward God or away. The Concept of Desolation and Consolation.

Nothing ever stands still. Like the planets in our solar system we are always moving toward the sun or away from it. Similarly the same can be said of our relationship with God. It is important that we know where we are at, and the direction we are going in our relationship with the Father.

Saint Ignatius Loyola was founder of the Jesuit order. After an early military career in which he was severely injured, he had a spiritual awakening and dedicated the rest of his life to God. He developed certain rules which can help us discern this "motion" in our life either to or from God. The terms Saint Ignatius uses to describe this are *Consolation and Desolation*.

Consolation: We are moving toward God... In consolation, the good spirit (i.e., the Holy Spirit, or the work and intersession of Angels and Saints) gives peace and builds us up with consolation by a growth of faith, hope, and love, giving us a greater sense of God's presence in our lives, manifested by good works, and making it easier to pray and overcome sin. In consolation we feel on top of the world and everything is going our way.

<u>Desolation</u>: We are moving away from God... In desolation, the evil spirit (Satan and his demons) try to bring us down with an increased anxiety and a sense of God's absence in our life, leading to discouragement and a decreased desire to pray. There is a growth of resentment, ingratitude, selfishness, doubt, fear, and so on. Our outlook becomes increasingly gloomy and self-obsessed. We are being led away from God. In our disheartened state we are more prone to be deceived and give in to our temptations.

The ebb and flow of consolation and desolation is the normal path of the Christian life; thus when in consolation we should humble ourselves and be on guard for the turn.

When we find ourselves entering desolation we should pause to consider God's purposes for allowing it. The first reason is due to some spiritual negligence on

our part. Desolation can then be a "wake-up call," calling us back. The second reason is to teach us some spiritual lesson, and the third is to show us our absolute need for grace.

Whatever the reason Saint Ignatius tells us to resist vehemently when we are first tempted or feel ourselves slip into desolation, thus we place ourselves in the best position. If we do not, the strength of temptation grows and snowballs upon us. He also tells us that resisting temptation while we are in desolation allows us to grow spiritually.

Saint Ignatius concludes his rules with a discussion of Satan's tactics. We have to learn to recognize Satan's work and act contrary to these movements and temptations through prayer, meditation and active resistance.

I am constrained by space to go further. Saint Ignatius' rules are worth further study and reflection. I recommend asking your adult religious education program administrator or your pastor to include it your parishes educational program.

- 1. Should you stay home from Divine Liturgy? Please use your own prudence. If you believe you are sick, or you are in danger, you are dispensed from attending, and Gad will bless you for praying home.
- 2. Should you avoid receiving Holy Communion on spoon? St. Paul says about communion, "Let each one examine himself." If you believe you are sick, or that you are in danger because of weak health, and you do not receive, I promise you that God will still bless you with His abundance of graces.
