To be a Saint

Prayer – Part three: Are you a good fighter?

There is nothing more worthwhile than to pray to God and to converse with him, for prayer unites us with God as his companions. Saint John Chrysostom, Homily 6

In this letter, we will go a step farther into a prayerful life. We know from the first two letters that:

Prayer is our way of talking to God. Our way of building our relationship with our Creator.

Simple prayers, especially those from the heart, work better then complex prayers using words we don't truly understand. As Saint John of the Ladder said "Pray in all simplicity. For both the tax collector and the prodigal son were reconciled to God by a single phrase."

Praying well takes practice. In the words of Saint John again; "Until we have acquired genuine prayer, we are like people teaching children to begin to walk."

Satan does not want us to have any relationship with God. In this letter we will expand on this last point. But first a question; are you a good fighter? That's right, for to have a strong prayer life, and a well-developed relationship with God, you must fight Satan at each step, for he will surely fight against you. Remember through prayer and good works we are slowly shaped and formed into a reflection of God. Satan will fight against that with all of his power. During prayer, he will do this primarily through temptation and distraction.

In earlier letters we spoke of calming your emotions, turning off the news of the day and finding a quiet place before we start our prayers. During prayer, expect to be distracted, expect temptation. For many, it is a simple matter of distracting thoughts that pop into your mind. Trivial matters, that oh so quickly take our mind completely off of our prayer focus. This is especially true when we know the prayers so well that we say them in auto-pilot.

Sometimes the distractions are not trivial matters, but involve real life situations. These matters often are the subject of our prayers. For example, you are asking through prayer the grace to deal with a financial situation, and suddenly find yourself running over various financial options in your mind, while your prayer goes into auto-pilot. Other distractions can occur after a particularly good piece of news or misfortunate news. Anything that tends to stir your emotion could be used to distract you. For still others, the distraction becomes something worse and could involve truly evil visions and temptations

accompanied by a waterfall of terrible images. For these situations I recommend consulting your pastor or spiritual advisor.

In all of these cases we are seeing the work of Satan, the evil one, who is trying to distract us from God. Envision if you would a fly, flying around your head, landing here and there on your face, you swat at it but to no avail. It distracts you so much that you completely ignore what you are doing to kill the fly.

Like the analogy of the fly, when you recognize the distraction put in front of you, the temptation may be to do direct battle with Satan, trying to rebuke him in some fashion. Do not seek this battle. The more you try to fight with Satan, the more Satan defeats you, because he is keeping you from God! Remember Satan knows you better then you know yourself. He knows your past. He does not know your future, but he can predict it to a degree based on what he knows of you. He knows your weaknesses and will seek to use them against you. Satan wants only to distract you from God. So, do not engage these thoughts of distraction during prayer.

These distractions and temptations come into being <u>only if we allow them to exist</u>. So, when they do come, ask yourself two questions. Is this thought mine? Do I want this thought? If the answers are no, then reject these thoughts outright and focus on God. A simple prayer of *God protect me*, or *Jesus save me*, may be all you need to refocus from the distraction back on God. Notice in both prayers we turned toward God, avoiding direct battle with Satan. As Saint John of the Ladder taught us; remind yourself that you stand before the presence of God.

Seek quality over quantity. What if the answers to the questions above are yes? At times when our emotions are high, and we simply cannot focus, take a break; ask God to bring you calm, and come back to prayer when you are composed. Pushing through your prayers when you are distracted is not productive, and indeed could lead to a weakening in your spiritual life. The length of our prayer time, and time of day are also considerations, but far too much to talk about here. I recommend you discuss these or other related topics with your pastor or within your prayer group, or with your spiritual advisor if you have one.

Finally, take comfort. As long as we are attacked, it means we are walking the right path toward God.
