To be a Saint – Our call to Catholic Charity.

"So Faith, Hope and Love abide. These three; but the greatest of these is love." 1Cor 13:13

Charity in its purest sense means love, and encompasses our love for God and our love for others. <u>Each Catholic has a *calling* to love</u>. Love is the ultimate perfection of the human spirit since it is a reflection and glorification of God's nature.

"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, and patience, forbearing one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also forgive. And over all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony." Col 3:12-14

How to Develop the Virtue of Charity? Answer your calling.

We all have some type of talent given to us by God. Those talents were meant to be used to glorify God. Most Catholics do not have the calling of a Mother Teresa. The calling for most of us is more modest, but just as important. So how do we develop it? The formula is to start with those closest to us, starting with yourself and work your way outward.

Start with ourselves?? Just so. Remember, as baptized Catholics we are a temple for the Holy Spirit. Seek purity in thought, word and deed. Seek not to console yourself with personal pleasure and the illusions of this world, which lead to sin and defilement, but rather seek God. Take care, and respect your temple, body and soul.

Expand your love to your spouse and family. Those we live close to are often the ones we neglect and mistreat. We tend to take them for granted, or take out our frustrations on them because they are, well, available. Our family is a precious gift from God. Showing unconditional love for each of our family members and teaching love and respect to our children is a noble work of love. Similarly, few charitable acts compare to, and are as humbling, as taking care of aged parents and relatives.

Volunteer in your parish. We don't need to look very far to find individuals or a group to help out. Our own parishes are a great place to offer our help. Start by contacting your pastor and ask how you can help. Start small; so many good volunteers try to do it all, only to find themselves in complete frustration. Most parishes have clubs and organizations that work in and around the church, cleaning, performing maintenance, or assisting with special needs. All parishes have a food basket for the poor, or collect money and clothing to support the poor. When was the last time you dropped off a donation?

We can find no better example of working in our holy churches then the Blessed Virgin Mary. According to tradition, Mary's parents Saint Joachim and Saint Anne, pledged Mary to the Temple in Jerusalem at the age of three. Mary lived and served in the Temple cleaning, and assisting till the age of fourteen when she was betrothed to Saint Joseph. The various altar guilds we find working faithfully in our churches today carry on this sacred tradition. I am sure the Blessed Virgin is smilling down on them.

Consider getting involved with community charitable organizations. This is a wonderful way to get outside of your immediate community and help those in need. I would recommend staying with a local group and one that you know well. There are unfortunately groups that profess to be charitable organizations that are scamming well intentioned individuals. Do your homework!

In all your works of charity, remember the words in Matthew Chapter 6 and do not seek recognition. Rather do your work for the sake of love and so far as possible without drawing attention to yourself.

"Love is patient and kind. Love is not jealous, or boastful, it is not arrogant or rude, Love does not insist on its own way, it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong, but rejoices in the right. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." 1 Cor 13:4-7
